#### Eligibility under Phase - I of PhD Admission:

All candidates who are exempted from the entrance examination as per the University of Delhi Ordinance VI dated August 9, 2017 [*Procedure for Award of Master of Philosophy (MPhil) and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) Degree*] are eligible for the interview, provided they apply through the University admission portal **and** upload relevant documents and research proposal in accordance with this notification using the email ID : [exam@buddhist.du.ac.in](mailto:exam@buddhist.du.ac.in).

#### Research Proposal and Document:

All candidates who have applied for the PhD Program on the portal under Phase-I **must upload soft copies** [.pdf/.doc/.docx format] of their research proposals, copy of the online application for PhD Admissions 2023, and other relevant documents (qualifications, caste/category specific certificates, document indicating exemption from entrance, etc.) **by Thursday, 24 August 2023** using the [exam@buddhist.du.ac.in](mailto:exam@buddhist.du.ac.in).

Those candidates selected for admission, who have not done research methodology course, will be required to do the required course work in research methods and other courses that the Department may consider necessary.

#### Note:

1. Candidates compulsorily send the proposal/documents to the **email ID [exam@buddhist.du.ac.in](mailto:exam@buddhist.du.ac.in)**. Any candidate who has applied through portal but fails to fill this form will not be called for interviews.
2. Candidates are required to submit the copy of their proposals/applications/documents. Either directly in the department office or through the mail : [exam@buddhist.du.ac.in](mailto:exam@buddhist.du.ac.in)
3. **Proposal for PhD Program must follow the attached guidelines.**
4. Proposals submitted in Hindi must be in **Unicode** Font only.
5. **The interviews shall be conducted in physical mode, tentatively beginning from 28 August 2023 onwards.** Final interview schedule shall be displayed on the Department website.

**Indicative Guidelines for Research Proposal**

14 August 2023

**Components of the Proposal:**

The research proposal needs to include the following components, preferably in the order listed here:

**1. Introduction/background**

‘What’, ‘Why’ and ‘How’ of your research.

§ What do you want to study/problematize/look at/examine?

§ Why are you interested in the topic of your choice? What is the relevance of your study? What is the value addition that you seek to provide?

§ How do you plan to examine the topic: stating your methodology and strategy?

**2. Review of the literature and identification of literature gap**

This would form the bulk of proposal. Please do not write a bibliographical essay. You need to review the existing literature and connect different scholarly works/other sources that make them relevant to your research question. Situate your arguments in and around the existing works. A thematic review is advisable. Cite all sources that you include even indirectly in your paper. Follow in-text citations and mention the last name of Author with Year in parentheses. Eg. (Sarkar, 1919)

Avoid footnotes and stick to in-text citation.

**3. Definition, Rationale and Scope of the study**

Define the study, provide working definition of key terms  
Provide rationale/justification, identify gap and state the value addition  
State the limitations – what the research is not able to do

**4. Research Question and Hypothesis**

- Statement of Research Problem
- Central Question
- Related Questions

There has to be one (or more) clear research questions and corresponding hypothesis (hypotheses). Your hypothesis is the tentative answer to your research question.

## 5. Research Methodology

Stating your methodology and strategy in detail. This can include your theoretical framework, and the type of source you want to consult. You can mention about the qualitative/ quantitative/narrative/theoretical approach that you seek to follow and explain it. If you plan to use case study/studies, justify the choice. This will depend on the work.

## 6. Tentative Chapterisation

Mention the headings of tentative chapters with a brief description of the content of each chapter.

## 7. Bibliography

Cite all sources in alphabetical order, last name first.

Refer to the examples below for specific source types:

(You may follow APA or MLA style; the list should follow uniformity is style)

### Text style:

The main text should be in Times New Roman, Font size 12, 1.5 spacing, and default black font. Page margins should be 1.5 inch (3.81 cm) on right and 1 inch (2.54 cm) on all other sides. Direct quotations should be single spaced, left indented and double quoted. Heading and Sub-headings should be **Bold** and level 2 subheadings should *italicise*.

Proposal has to be typed and not handwritten.

For Hindi proposals, use Mangal (or any Unicode) font.

### Word Range:

3500 - 7000 words.

### About plagiarism:

**Plagiarism/similarity over 18%** will invite penalty. Plagiarism implies using others' arguments without acknowledging the same. You need to use in-text citation in your paper even if you use others' arguments indirectly or paraphrase those arguments. In case of doubt, it is better to over cite.

  
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
